PETITIONS AND DELEGATES

1. Jennifer Rice

Jennifer Rice is the Parliamentary Secretary for Rural Health. She has been working on the possible ER closures at the Masset Hospital. The latest update that she has received from Northern Health stated that they have managed to secure staff coverage until the end of March 2023 and are hoping to extend the timeline further than that.

MLA Rice was originally appointed the Parliamentary Secretary for Emergency Management and remembered the two large earthquakes and subsequent evacuations that occurred on Haida Gwaii during that time. She now represents Northern BC as the Parliamentary Secretary for Rural Health for the next 16 months. Her mandate is:

Village of Masset Regular Council Meeting of February 27, 2023

- 1. To support the Minister of Health with a health and human resources plan by keeping an eye on recruitment for rural communities and facilitate getting concerns of rural residents heard in the governmental process.
- 2. Examine the travel assistance program
- 3. Rural maternal health and expanding the midwifery program

Councillor Johnston stated that the Village of Masset found out what was happening at the hospital by a whistle blower and that the planning has been going on since October 2022. His concern is that some people will not be able to afford the travel down island if the ER hours are reduced. Councillor Johnston stated that he was fortunate to get chemotherapy for his cancer treatment on-island but feels that there is inequity between the two hospitals. MLA Rice stated that the person that oversees hospitals on Haida Gwaii will be coming to the islands on March 12, 2023 and she will relay his concerns to her.

He also stated that the kitchen was closed in the Masset Hospital but not the Northern Haida Gwaii Hospital.

Councillor Pages stated that he has lost confidence in Northern Health's recruiting of staff for the Masset Hospital. He has heard from people that have requested to come to Masset to work that they have been told to go to other communities. He stated that they are going to get more vocal about the lack of recruitment. Masset funded 60% of the hospital through the Municipal Finance Authority and is reimbursed through a lease with Northern Health.

Larger centers on the mainland can commute to the larger centers for hospital services but on Haida Gwaii that travel can take up to a week because of having to travel offisland by ferry or plane and this causes a financial hardship for most people. MLA Rice stated that they have a rural caucus now and are reviewing the TAPS system. She stated that she needs our help to educate her piers on this issue as they do not understand the issues and hardships.

Councillor Carty suggested that there would be merit to going into the schools here and talking to the youth to promote the need to get the education/training needed to fill the positions here. MLA Rice stated that Northern Health told her that there is planning for a local training package that is proceeding quickly. Further discussion needs to be held regarding the obstacles regarding the training.

Councillor Carty also stated that we will do everything we can to support MLA Rice getting our concerns heard. The Village of Masset Health Committee is functioning and could be a resource.

The meeting was called to order at 7:21 pm.

OPENING REMARKS

Councillor Pages read a statement of purpose for the public meeting regarding the application by Singing Surf Inn to establish a licenced facility in Masset. All participants were assured that they would have an opportunity to make a presentation about the application only and were asked to clearly state their name and address before commencing their remarks. Councillor Pages also indicated that Council members were there to listen to concerns only, not debate the issue nor make a decision at this time.

APPLICANT PRESENTATION

Councillor Pages opened the floor to the presentation by David Carson and Cindy Lee of The Singing Surf Inn. Mr. Carson and Ms. Lee stated that this licence application has taken almost a year to get approved. They are very anxious to open and provide the community with another choice for a pub that would employ people and raise money. He stated that this facility has had a liquor license in the past. Their plans include providing an establishment for people to watch sports on TV, jam nights and live bands, various tournaments and have special occasion events. They will be open 7 days a week from 11:00 am to 2:00 am.

We have lost confidence in the recruitment procedures.

We would request all minutes and correspondence from Northern Health regarding recruitment and the discussions which have been ongoing since October of 2022.

Could we have an independent third party manager to assess the situation at the Northern Haida Gwaii Hospital regarding work conditions and the so called toxic work environment?

Growing Communities Fund helps B.C. communities serve people better

Local governments are receiving a \$1-billion boost through one-time funding to address the needs of their growing communities.

Grants will be distributed to municipalities and regional districts using a funding formula that reflects population size and growth.

"Our communities are growing and this puts more pressure on community centres, parks and swimming pools that families rely on. To help, we're providing the single largest provincial investment in communities in B.C.'s history," said Premier David Eby. "The new Growing Communities Fund will help local communities get building. Growing communities need our support and this funding will make a big difference for everyone."

On Feb. 10, 2023, government announced the Growing Communities Fund, which provides a one-time total of \$1 billion in grants to all 188 B.C. municipalities and regional districts.

Grants will be distributed using a formula that incorporates an initial \$500,000 per municipality or district, and further adjustments for population size and per-capita population growth between 2016 and 2021, based on BC Stats data. This method considers the impacts of service and amenity demands on smaller and rural communities and the additional pressures experienced by faster-growing communities. Grants will be distributed to local governments by the end of March 2023.

"I know that our local governments are working hard to keep up with the growing demands of their communities. Through cross-government co-operation, we can address the unique needs in each community to ensure they can thrive into the future," said Anne Kang, Minister of Municipal Affairs. "These grants will support projects that each community needs the most, like new affordable housing and child care facilities, road improvements or recreation centres."

All local governments are required to report on the use of funds in their annual audited financial statements. The Ministry of Municipal Affairs will provide further guidance to municipalities and regional districts on the use of their funds in the coming weeks.

"The transfer of these funds provides massive investments for every local government in the province," said Jen Ford, president, Union of B.C. Municipalities. "This new funding will allow communities to accelerate the replacement of aging systems, and expansion to current services to better meet the demands of growing populations. The approach of providing funding upfront will ensure that these funds are directed to the most urgent priorities identified in each community."

As you settle into your important roles, we once again encourage you to consider how your actions, policies and bylaws can make your communities safer, more caring places for people and animals.

We know that you face many challenges and competing priorities, but we clearly heard through our pre-election priorities survey that animal welfare is top of mind for your constituents. The responses we received from over 13,000 British Columbians demonstrate strong public support for:

- Advocating to the province for more pet-friendly housing

The North West Regional Hospital District has written to the Minister of Health regarding the replacement of the Bulkley Valley District Hospital in Smithers. A copy of this correspondence is attached to this email.

In 2019, Northern Health submitted a master plan to the province, which is the first step towards the replacement of the hospital. The master plan must be approved by the province if the project is to proceed to the next step, the development of a concept plan. This concept plan is developed and submitted to the province for approval before the business plan can be prepared and then hopefully approved by the Treasury board. This process takes years before an approval can be reached, and then the construction phase commences but will also take several years.

Masset Healthcare Committee

Review of options to add new members.

The current healthcare committee bylaw structure is laid out in bylaw #502 from 1998 and amended in bylaw #649 of 2021 to have a membership total of 6.

Quorum of the committees is a majority so 50% +1 or 4 members.

The committee is specified as a select committee of Council under section 142 of the Community Charter as copied below:

Select committees of council

142 (1)A council may establish and appoint a select committee to consider or inquire into any matter and to report its findings and opinion to the council.(2)At least one member of a select committee must be a council member.(3)Subject to subsection (2), persons who are not council members may be appointed to a select committee.

The Village of Masset Procedure Bylaw Section 23 (4) states:

Members of the Council may attend the meetings of any of its Committees and shall not be allowed to vote, but may be allowed to take part in any discussion or debate by permission of a majority of the Committee.

The current committee membership consists of Mayor Sheri Disney, Councillor Barry Pages, Councillor Bret Johnston, Margo Hearne and Matt Menard with one vacant position. These would comprise the voting members of the committee. As with all committees other people can be invited to participate and contribute to the committee but only those 6 positions appointed by resolution of Council are the voting members.

Council has expressed a desire to have participation on the committee from other communities and groups, specifically Old Massett, Port Clements and the Tow Hill area at a minimum.

Option 1:

Maintain current membership total of 6:

Only one council member is required for a select committee as noted above. Choose 1-2 council members and reappoint the remaining positions as desired.

i.e. 1 VOM council member, 1 Old Massett, 1, Port Clements and 1 Tow Hill, Margo Hearne and Matt Menard. Quorum remains 4 members.

Masset Healthcare Committee

Review of options to add new members.

Advantages:

- 1) does not require a change in the committee bylaw and can simply be achieved by a council resolution and can be readily changed at any time by another resolution.
- 2) As noted in the Procedure bylaw above any council members can participate in the debate or discussion at a committee (subject to permission of the voting members) but cannot vote.

Disadvantages:

 reduces Council control of the committee (if that is a concern) and quorum could be achieved without a council member. It should be noted however that all Committee recommendations must be subsequently approved by Council at a regular meeting.

Option 2:

Amend the bylaw to include more members:

Again only one council member is **required** for a select committee as noted above. So the options here have more variables. Assuming that the Committee size should be kept to the smallest possible and the existing committee members wish to remain as voting members the bylaw could be amended to a total of 8 members:

i.e. 3 existing VOM council members, 1 Old Massett, 1, Port Clements and 1 Tow Hill, Margo Hearne and Matt Menard. Quorum would be 5 members. Advantage:

 Ensures that all members of the committee are voting members and retains existing members.

Disadvantages:

- 1) Requires a change to the bylaw and thus requires a minimum of two Council meetings to achieve.
- 2) Again reduces Council control of the committee (if a concern).
- 3) The committee may become inoperable should the new members drop off for any reason.

Recommendation:

Council provide clear direction on how they want the committee to be structured so that staff can make any required bylaw amendments and or notify committee members.

VILLAGE OF MASSET

BYLAW NO. 502

A Bylaw to establish the Masset Health Care Committee.

WHEREAS the Municipal Act empowers the Council to establish a select committee to consider or inquire into any matter and to report its findings and opinion to Council;

AND WHEREAS the Council for the Village of Masset desires to be advised on all matters which relate to the establishment, operation, running and development of health care and hospital services of the Village of Masset;

NOW THEREFORE the Council for the Village of Masset in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

INTERPRETATION

- 1. "Committee" shall mean and include the Masset Health Care Committee;
 - "Council" shall mean the Village of Masset Council;
 - "Village" shall mean the Corporation of the Village of Masset;
 - "Province" shall mean the Province of British Columbia.
- 2. There is hereby established a select committee to be known as the Masset Health Care Committee whose purpose is to recommend and advise the Council on all matters which relate to health care and hospital services;
- 3. The committee shall be comprised of twelve members appointed by resolution at a duly constituted Council meeting.
- 4. All members shall remain members of the Committee until their respective successors are appointed by Council.
- 5. If any member of the Committee is absent from three consecutive committee meetings the Council may, upon a recommendation of the Committee, remove the member from the Committee.
- 6. The Council may remove any member of the Committee for malfeasance or any other good and sufficient cause.
- 7. Annually, during the month of January, the Committee shall hold a meeting at which a chair and vice-chair shall be selected from the voting members. Any member of the Committee shall be eligible for selection as chair or vice-chair. Subsequently, Council shall be requested to approve these appointments.
- 8. Meetings of the Committee shall be held on a regular basis at a time set by resolution of the Committee at least once every month, and at such other times as deemed necessary.
- 9. A quorum for regular and special meetings of the Committee shall be six members, one of whom shall be the chair or vice-chair.

MASSET HEALTH CARE COMMITTEE BYLAW 502

- 10. Special meetings may be called by the chair or vice-chair.
- 11. Meeting procedures shall be conducted according to good meeting practices and disputes resolved in accordance with Robert Rules of Order, newly revised.
- 12. Proceedings of the Committee meetings shall be recorded and a copy of the minutes forwarded to Council for approval. Recommendations of the Committee on a matter for adoption by Council are not to be made available to the public until approved by Council.
- 13. All outgoing correspondence shall be forwarded to Council prior to mailing, and the original of all incoming correspondence shall be forwarded to the Council.
- 14. All expenditures must be approved by a Committee resolution and purchases recorded and actioned by a Village purchase order.
- 15. Neither the Committee nor any member thereof, shall have the power to pledge the credit of the Village in connection with any matters whatsoever, nor shall the Committee nor any member thereof have any power to authorize any expenditure to be charged against the Village.
- 16. Annually, before the 7th day of March, the Committee shall submit to Council, on the Village budget request form, expenditures proposed to be made by the Committee during the current year.
- 17. The Masset Community Health Care Committee Bylaw No. 459 is hereby repealed.
- 18. This bylaw may be cited as the "Masset Health Care Committee Bylaw No. 502".



Background: Gwaii Trust has provided funding to the Protocol Table since 2020 to fund administrative support for the table as well as covering basic meeting costs. Funds are administered through the Council of the Haida Nation.

Gwaii Trust allocated \$35,000 in their 2022 fall budget sessions toward the next year of funding for the Protocol Table. This amount will cover costs for online (Zoom) and in-person meetings as well as the continued employment of a part-time executive assistant from November 2023 to May 2024. Budget attached below.

Note: The Protocol Table's request to Gwaii Trust is usually for a full year of funding, however with some changes in the budget we received an extension last year that will cover most of 2023. If Gwaii Trust continues to support this funding stream, the following application would be made in early 2024 for funding for May 2024 onward.

Issue: The submission will be straightforward and based on previous applications. The Protocol Table Executive Assistant needs a motion of support from the Protocol Table to accompany this application (due April 1).

Request: That council motions to support an application to Gwaii Trust for 2023 funding in the amount of \$35,000.
